OTD/PhD – Dual Degree Program

OTD students at The Ohio State University have the unique option to enroll in the OTD/PhD dual degree program. With this option, students can overlap their clinical doctorate program with the PhD program. A student can decide to enroll in the dual program at any point during their clinical OTD program. The following is a sample timeline for an OTD student who were to apply to the PhD program during their second year in the program:

- Accept admission to OTD program
- Begin the first year of the program
 - Begin OT curriculum and develop clinical skills with cohort
 - Become involved in research
- Begin second year of program
 - Select a faculty research advisor whose area of expertise aligns with your research area of interest who will become dissertation advisor for the PhD portion of your dual program
 - o Become integrated into the research programs of the faculty advisor
 - o Complete the full-time clinical affiliations at the end of the second year
 - Apply to the PhD program
- Begin third year of the OTD program and begin to integrate PhD program
 - Student will begin to incorporate PhD level courses
 - o Complete the OTD portion of education in the summer and sit for national licensure
- Begin fourth year in autumn/formally become a full-time PhD student
 - Due to the overlapping of degrees, excess credits from previous year will be counted toward the PhD. Students in this combined program are anticipated to be a year ahead of traditional PhD classmates beginning that autumn.
